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Deudneys Farm CCV Trial.

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Saturday 12th October

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The two clerks, Harry Powell assisted by Shaun Stocking intended to lay out sections on Friday afternoon, but work commitments intervened necessitating an early visit to the wood at first light on Saturday morning. It was a delight to discover that many of the old well-run areas were left untouched on this occasion in favour of some less driven localities. For most sections, the new areas entailed a trek through lumps, bumps, and trees before ending up with a challenging finish. Surprisingly the very last section of the day explored a new area that no one in attendance had seen before let alone driven.

It was an encouraging entry of twelve drivers who were treated to the delights of Deudneys courtesy of the Daniels family.

The Trial

Section 1 and unusually first off, the line Dan had the advantage before the trail greased up and only, he and Terry managed to claim a well-earned clear.

Section 2 what was to be recognised as the day's format, a wander around the vegetation before tackling a difficult finish. Half the field qualified for a two but the other half were too casual around a tight corner in the trees and came away with a costly nine.

Section 4 was the first of two located in the big pit at the top of the farm. This was a section of two halves. The first challenge involved a tight turn followed by a short sharp uphill gate which proved just one gate too many for half the field. Those that were successful at this point then faced a steep downhill journey to a sharp right hand turn off camber which proved impossible to master even resulting in Terry taking a tumble.

Also in the pit, the one before lunch used the remaining banks to advantageous effect with a range of scores. The bug in the system here proved to be a tight turn getting from 6 to 5. Last away on this one, Franklin had studied the form and successfully found an alternative route making himself and Dave G the only two drivers to proceed beyond this point.

On the penultimate section of the day, Ben Green, suffered the curse of the 'first off the line' syndrome and was immediately followed by Jamie Firrell who, although taking an alternative line, suffered the same fate both adding double figures to their scores. Steve, having returned to the group after suffering a puncture on the previous section, fared worse when a CV decided this would be a good time to 'pop.'

Harry accepted that in the rush to get the trial laid out and the fact that none of the sections had been driven, it was possible that some would need adjustment. As was the case with the last section of the day which took us through an area of woodland that was new to us all. An early meander through the trees on a side slope now proved too tricky after the morning rain. Favourable modifications were made resulting in a fair number of the drivers successfully mastering this final challenge to finish on a satisfying clear - although the last climb of the day still managed to catch out some.

When the scores were added Dave and Terry were joint leaders on nine penalty points, the overall winner then being decided on clears which gave the position to Terry with Dave having to be content with best in class followed by Franklin and Keith.
